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HB 2156 (Chapter 387 W/O): NOW: tax credits; motion picture credits

Requires the Arizona Commerce Authority to implement an Arizona Motion Picture Production Program and establishes individual and corporate income tax credits for motion picture production costs.

HB 2157 (Chapter 2): supplemental appropriations; community-based services

Appropriates \$1,440,732,800 of expenditure authority and \$30,121,100 from the Children's Health Insurance Program Fund in FY 2022 for home and community-based services and funding formula requirements in the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System and the Department of Economic Security. Appropriates \$15,100,000 of expenditure authority in FY 2022 to the Department of Child Safety.

HB 2319 (Chapter 376): law enforcement activity; recording prohibition

Outlines requirements for a person making a video recording of a law enforcement activity. Establishes a class 3 misdemeanor for individuals who violate these requirements.

Expands the ability of the Arizona Office of Tourism to use promotional material and intellectual property.

Extends eligibility for a member of the Children's Health Insurance Program for 12 months after eligibility is determined.

An emergency measure that modifies requirements for the sale and purchase of catalytic converters by scrap metal dealers.

HB 2691 (Chapter 330): health care workforce; grant programs

Establishes the following health care workforce grant programs: 1) Nurse Education Investment Pilot Program; 2) Student Nurse Clinical Rotation and Licensed or Certified Nurse Training Pilot Program; 3) Licensed Registered Nurse Transition to Practice Program; 4) Preceptor Grant Program for Graduate Students; and 5) the Behavioral Health Pilot Program. Adds a requirement for each state university and community college to report on academic and vocational credits granted to members of the United States military.

Establishes the Arizona Department of Revenue Integrated Tax System Project Fund to implement a modernized tax system. Appropriates \$1,618,489,600 of Transaction Privilege Tax revenues to specified agency funds. Makes other changes related to taxation.

Contains provisions relating to transportation needed to implement the FY 2023 budget.

SB 1222 (Chapter 346): exempt property; tax credit; proceeds

Exempts refunded Earned Income Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit monies from court-ordered debt collection processes.

SB 1247 (Chapter 38): appropriations; named claimants

Appropriates monies in FY 2022 for the payment of claims against state agencies.

SB 1374 (Chapter 356): NOW: immunizations; pharmacists

Permits pharmacists to order and administer immunizations recommended by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for children at least six years old, rather than just for adults. Allows pharmacists to administer immunizations or vaccines to a person who is at least three years old with a prescription order or under a collaborative practice agreement.

SB 1490 (Chapter 331): appropriation; Cesar Chavez Boulevard

Appropriates \$33,000,000 from the state General Fund in FY 2023 to the Arizona Department of Transportation to construct, widen, repair and upgrade Cesar Chavez Boulevard in the City of San Luis.

SB 1566 (Chapter 226): state bar; attorney charges; damages

Requires the State Bar to be responsible for any attorney fees, investigation and court costs, any loss of future earnings and damage to the attorney's reputation if the State Bar does not prevail in the final disposition of an attorney discipline matter.

SB 1710 (Chapter 364): sports; tourism; film authority; appropriation

Establishes the Southern Arizona Sports, Tourism and Film Authority (Authority), consisting of Greenlee, Graham, Cochise, Santa Cruz, Pima and Pinal counties. Appropriates \$750,000 from the state General Fund to the Office of Tourism to fund the Authority.

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HB 2051 (Chapter 79): commission on the arts; continuation

Continues the Commission on the Arts for 8 years until July 1, 2030.

HB 2103 (Chapter 80): trademarks; service marks; trade names

Requires a trademark or trade name applicant to show that their trademark or trade name does not resemble, and is distinguishable from, existing marks or names.

HB 2120 (Chapter 368): NOW: workers' compensation; injuries; medical-only loss

Narrows the injuries that are reported by employers and physicians to those requiring medical treatment. Requires any experience rating adjustment, for claims involving medical-only loss, to be applied to reduce the impact of the loss in the employer's experience modification calculation. Conforms state civil penalties for employer violations of occupational health and safety standards to match OSHA's civil penalties.

HB 2123 (Chapter 279): NOW: funerals; regulations; continuation

Continues the Arizona Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers (Board) until March 31, 2023, retroactive to July 1, 2022. Transfers Board responsibilities to, and requires, beginning April 1, 2023, certain individuals to register with, a funeral services regulating authority of Arizona.

HB 2146 (Chapter 81): data security breach; notification

Adds the Director of the Arizona Department of Homeland Security to the list of individuals who receives a security systems breach notification if the breach affects more than 1,000 individuals.

HB 2172 (Chapter 126): real estate licensees; employers; compensation

Permits a real estate licensee to receive compensation from an employer, which the licensee if not licensed to, if specified criteria are met.

HB 2202 (Chapter 56 E): industrial commission; fee schedule; notice

An emergency measure that requires the Industrial Corporation of Arizona, prior to taking final action on the schedule of fees relating to attending injured employees and prescription medicines required for treatment, to: 1) prominently post on its publicly accessible website the proposed schedule of fees at least 30 days before conducting a public hearing on that proposed schedule of fees; 2) hold at least one meeting that all interested parties may jointly attend after posting the proposed schedule of fees, but before conducting the hearing on the proposed schedule of fees; and 3) at least 7 business days in advance, prominently post on its website the final proposed schedule of fees to be acted on for adoption.

HB 2203 (Chapter 176): NOW: special purpose banks; comparable; rights

Grants special purpose depository institutions that are chartered as a bank the same rights, powers, privileges and entitlements as a comparable in-state financial institution.

HB 2204 (Chapter 369): NOW: taxation; virtual currency; non-fungible tokens

Allows an income tax deduction, of the value of cryptocurrencies or non-fungible tokens (NFTs) received by an airdrop, to taxpayers. Additionally, this act allows taxpayers to subtract gas fees when calculating capital gains or losses related to the sale of cryptocurrencies or NFTs.

HB 2272 (Chapter 89): insurance; secondary sources

Asserts a secondary source on insurance does not constitute Arizona law or public policy.

HB 2273 (Chapter 137): transportation network company vehicles; inspections

Stipulates, for transportation network company (TNC) vehicles that are 10 years old or less, the TNC driver may submit an attestation that the vehicle meets the state vehicle safety and emissions standards instead of having the annual brake and tire inspection.

HB 2275 (Chapter 373): condominium termination; unit owners; percentage

Allows a condominium created on or after the effective date of this act to be terminated only by agreement of unit owners of units to which 95% of the votes in the association are allocated, with exceptions.

HB 2374 (Chapter 140): acute care services; pilot program

Allows hospitals participating in the Acute Care at Home Pilot Program, when providing healthcare services through the program, to include the services of mobile paramedics. Outlines requirements for mobile paramedics for participation in the program.

HB 2391 (Chapter 293): NOW: video services providers; enforcement; jurisdiction

Specifies that the Office of Administrative Hearings has original jurisdiction over video service laws unless the matter arises under the Constitution, laws or treaties of the U.S., including the Communications Act of 1934 and all other applicable federal law.

HB 2407 (Chapter 217): ambulances; mileage rate calculation

Provides factors for the Department of Health Services when calculating the proposed mileage rates for ambulances. Removes the authorization for the Department to establish ambulance mileage rates as defined by federal Medicare guidelines.

HB 2484 (Chapter 97): forcible entry; detainer; filing fee

Prohibits a court from either imposing or collecting a fee for filing an answer to a complaint, for forcible entry or detainer, and removes the forcible entry and detainer filing fee for a defendant.

HB 2485 (Chapter 286): eviction dismissal; sealed records

Requires records relating to any action for eviction or a forcible entry and detainer action in which the court dismisses or rules in favor of the tenant to be sealed. Requires the tenant's case records to be made available to specified individuals.

HB 2579 (Chapter 182): residential zoning; park model trailers

Requires a county to allow the use of a park model trailer as an accessory dwelling unit for a single-family residence in specified locations. Requires the park model trailer to be on a semi-permanent or permanent foundation that has utility connections and meets all drainage, floodplain, sanitary sewer or septic waste disposal requirements and all other zoning standards.

HB 2585 (Chapter 130): motor carrier; safety improvement

Asserts the deployment, implementation or use of safety improvement by a motor carrier may not be considered when evaluating a person's status as an employee, independent contractor or jointly employed employee.

HB 2586 (Chapter 109): electric charging providers

Asserts services engaged by companies to charge batteries for electric vehicles do not qualify electric charging providers as public service corporations.

HB 2599 (Chapter 265): administrative hearings; GRRC

Makes various revisions to laws relating to occupational licensure, the Governor's Regulatory Review Council petitions, agency rulemaking and appealable agency actions.

HB 2612 (Chapter 59): occupational regulation

Removes statutory references, with respect to occupational regulation, pertaining to *character, good, honesty, integrity, moral and trustworthy*.

HB 2660 (Chapter 282): liquor; licensing; processes; procedures

Allows a regional shopping center, a commercial office and retail center and an on-sale spirituous liquor licensee to apply to the Department of Liquor Licenses and Control for an extension of premises. Amends liquor statutes relating to Farm Winery Licenses and liquor sales.

HB 2674 (Chapter 185 E): NOW: housing supply study committee

An emergency measure that establishes the Housing Supply Study Committee for the purposes of: 1) reviewing data on the scope of housing supply and access; 2) compiling an overview of ways to address Arizona's housing shortage and to mitigate its causes; and 3) soliciting ideas and opinions of industry and subject matter experts and the community on additional recommendations.

HB 2678 (Chapter 384): state broadband office

Establishes the State Broadband Office, within the Arizona Commerce Authority, to: 1) coordinate the implementation of broadband programs; 2) coordinate and execute grant applications; 3) provide guidance in navigating regulatory and permitting processes for broadband infrastructure projects, policies and practices; 4) solicit feedback to develop long-term broadband policy priorities; and 5) develop plans to improve internet connectivity and resiliency.

HB 2679 (Chapter 169): employment discrimination; sexual harassment; definition

Modifies the definition of *employer* as it relates to employment discrimination.

HB 2694 (Chapter 298): department of real estate; fees

Removes the minimum fee amounts prescribed for real estate licensure. Permits an applicant, for a real estate salesperson license or broker license, to fulfill the course requirement for licensure through completing a *live classroom course* by a certified real estate school.

HB 2698 (Chapter 157): insurance; assignment of benefits

Applies statutory provisions relating to assignment of benefits to an insurer whether acting as an insurer or performing administrative services.

HB 2714 (Chapter 71): office of tourism; continuation

Continues the Arizona Office of Tourism for 8 years until July 1, 2030.

HB 2724 (Chapter 132): assisted living; distance requirements; prohibition

Requires a local government that has a zoning ordinance that restricts the distance between assisted living homes to establish an administrative procedure to grant exceptions as a reasonable accommodation under the federal Fair Housing Act.

HB 2731 (Chapter 187): regulatory sandbox; expansion

Expands the Regulatory Sandbox Program to include innovations other than financial products or services.

HB 2747 (Chapter 170): wholesale real estate buyers; disclosure

Establishes disclosure requirements for wholesale buyers and sellers of residential real property.

HB 2822 (Chapter 103): personal property; additional depreciation

Sets the valuation factor at 2.5% for specific personal property in class one, class two (P) and class six that is acquired and initially classified during or after tax year 2022.

SB 1021 (Chapter 340): health care liens; limitation

Specifies health care provider liens or assignments are enforceable by a cause of action and are subject to prescribed restrictions. Outlines the prescribed restrictions. Requires interested parties to compromise any lien or assignment and provides factors in determining the extent of such compromise. Permits certain individuals to file for a judicial determination. Applies the restriction and compromise requirements to liens that are filed for services that are provided beginning January 1, 2023.

SB 1066 (Chapter 4): raffles; nonprofits; length of existence

Reduces the period of time that a nonprofit organization must continuously exist in Arizona immediately before conducting a raffle from five years to one year.

SB 1118 (Chapter 342): NOW: insurance; fees; consent; medicare supplement

Makes various changes to statute relating to consenting for an insurer to delivery documents electronically, Medicare supplement insurance, exemptions for providing a certificate of creditable insurance and title insurers use of corporate names.

SB 1136 (Chapter 31): public works; contracts; payments

Outlines requirements for the payment of contractors and subcontractors for changed or additional work in construction contracts with certain governmental entities.

SB 1166 (Chapter 111): public employers; union contracts

Prohibits a public employer from spending public monies for union activities and from entering into an employment contract with a public employee to engage in union activities or provide any form of compensation for engaging in union activities. Defines *union activities* as: 1) political activities performed by a union that involve advocating for the election or defeat of any political candidate; or 2) lobbying or attempting to influence the passage or defeat of federal or state legislation, local ordinances or any ballot measure.

SB 1168 (Chapter 343): vacation rentals; short-term rentals; enforcement

Prescribes additional regulations a local government may impose on a short-term rental. Provides requirements for a short-term rental and local government regarding regulatory permits or licenses. Establishes caps to civil penalties imposed for verified violations. Removes the Department of Revenue's authority to impose civil penalties on online lodging operators for verified violations.

SB 1179 (Chapter 212): NOW: video service; boundary change; definition

Modifies the definition of *video service* and *video service provider* as it relates to local government licensing and regulation of video service providers. Adds requirements for notification to video service providers of a boundary change by a local government.

SB 1204 (Chapter 172): mortgage brokers; bankers; qualifications

Allows an employee of an affiliated entity or parent company to be designated as the responsible individual for a mortgage broker, commercial mortgage broker or commercial mortgage banker licensee and removes the state-residency requirement for the responsible individual for a commercial mortgage banker licensee. Requires the Director of the Department of Insurance and Financial Institutions to administer certificates of exemption to applicants and outlines exemption application procedures.

SB 1248 (Chapter 146): beer shipments; coercion; prohibition

Deems it unlawful for a supplier to coerce or attempt to coerce a wholesaler to accept delivery of beer or any other commodity that the wholesaler did not order or that the wholesaler canceled. Prescribes a civil penalty for the unlawful coercion of wholesalers.

SB 1257 (Chapter 16): long-term recreational vehicle parks; caregivers

Authorizes a disabled resident of a recreational vehicle (RV) rental space to have a caregiver occupy the RV to provide necessary live-in health care, personal care or supportive services.

SB 1276 (Chapter 19): state real estate department; continuation

Continues the Arizona Department of Real Estate for 8 years until July 1, 2030, retroactive to July 1, 2022.

SB 1278 (Chapter 255): NOW: labor benefits organizations; damages; definitions

Outlines what established benefits from a third-party benefits organization (TBO) can be considered disproportionate, excessive or discriminatory; entitles an employer or employee to recover triple the calculated damages from an TBO for benefits incurred or paid. TBOs are exempt from this liability if they: 1) disclose certain financial information; 2) allow employees to opt out of benefits; and 3) allow employees to terminate their relationship with the organization without penalty.

SB 1394 (Chapter 45): DIFI; business name; trade name

Provides requirements for certain licensees under the jurisdiction of the Arizona Department of Insurance and Financial Institutions using an assumed or trade name.

An emergency measure that establishes the Hydrogen Study Committee to investigate and evaluate the production, distribution, use and storage of hydrogen.

SB 1403 (Chapter 162): NOW: workers' compensation; industrial commission; claim

Provides reporting requirements for insurance carriers and self-insured employers who receive notification of an injury by an injured employee who intends to file a workers' compensation claim.

SB 1494 (Chapter 360): COVID-19 vaccine; unemployment insurance

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HB 2024 (Chapter 257): alkaline hydrolysis; facilities; operators; licensure

Establishes regulatory and licensure requirements for alkaline hydrolysis facilities and operators. Allows the Arizona State Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers to determine fee amounts for alkaline hydrolysis facility licenses, operator licenses and permits.

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HB 2130 (Chapter 242): recreational users; property

Limits a landowner's liability for injuries to recreational or educational users that occur on the landowner's land. Declares recreational or educational users are liable for any damage they cause to the landowner's land or property.

Authorizes a county board of supervisors to enter agreements with federal, state and local governments to enable federal funding for specified projects that increase water supply and availability for municipal water providers, irrigation districts for agricultural use within the county and county flood control districts for aquifer recharge within the county.

Class one properties currently have an assessed valuation percentage of 17.5%, which reduces by 0.5% annually until reaching 16% in 2025. This act extends the 0.5% annual reduction for two more years, reducing the valuation of class one properties to 15% by 2027. Additionally, the state equalization assistance tax rate is set at specified amounts for Tax Years 2022 through 2027.

SB 1095 (Chapter 341): property tax exemptions; statutory conformity

Exempts from property taxes, conditional on the voter approval of Senate Concurrent Resolution 1011, the property of veterans with service or nonservice-connected disabilities up to the amount of \$4,117 if the property's assessed value exceeds \$27,970.

SB 1264 (Chapter 41): internal revenue code; conformity

Conforms Arizona tax statutes to the federal Internal Revenue Code as of January 1, 2022, to reflect changes adopted by the U.S. Congress, including those provisions of the PPP (Paycheck Protection Program) Extension Act of 2021 and the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, that became effective during 2021.

Requires the purchaser of a property tax lien to send a notice of intent to file an action to foreclose to the property owner's mailing address.

Allows affidavits filed to the county assessor, for the purpose of claiming a tax exemption, to be submitted electronically. Requires the county assessor or other tax officer accepting an electronic affidavit or notice of claim to provide the claimant with an electronic acknowledgement of receipt.

Requires, for the purposes of determining limited property value, a property's change of use to be physical and objectively verifiable; a change in the occupant or classification of a single-family residence does not constitute a change in use.

Exempts, from Transaction Privilege Tax and from municipal tax, the gross income derived from the sale of vehicles, trailers or semitrailers which are: 1) sold to nonresidents for use outside of Arizona; and 2) used for commercial purposes.

HB 2617 (Vetoed): voter registration; cancellation; causes

Outlines additional reasons for a voter registration to be canceled. Specifies that the citizenship information received by the county recorder comes from a summary report from the jury commissioner or manager. Requires the county recorder to send a person notice that the person's voter registration will be canceled in 90 days unless satisfactory evidence of qualification is provided and directs the county recorder to cancel the registration after the 90-day period if evidence is not provided.
